■ takes many voices to effect the change we want to see in the world. That is why Crossroads International's focus is on leveraging knowledge, expertise and dollars to strengthen the capacity of individuals and organizations driving change in some of the poorest countries in the world. With every woman who speaks out and with every cooperative turning a profit, the impact of Crossroads' work is amplified.

Creating opportunities for girls and women is crucial in a world where most do not enjoy basic rights. In Ghana, human rights and legal literacy programs are changing the way the public perceives women. More than ever, women are standing up to defend their rights and those of others. In December elections the number of elected female MPs swelled from 19 to 30; Crossroads was proud to support their success with the training of women candidates in advance of the election. In Swaziland, Girls' Empowerment Clubs grew by leaps and bounds, developing the confidence of more than twice as many girls as last year to speak out against abuse. With the support of our networks, funding was secured to transform the lives of even more girls through the launch of 20 new clubs in 2013-14.

With Crossroads support, our partners increased job creation by 61 per cent over last year through innovative entrepreneurial programs in Mali and Senegal. The resulting financial stability is transforming communities through improved access to health care and education. In Bolivia, coffee producers at the COAINE cooperative are celebrating their third shipment of fair trade coffee to Canada, a result of years of collaboration with Crossroads volunteers to establish relationships with Canadian coffee micro-roasters.

The growth and achievements of our programming reflects years of dedication and unwavering support from our volunteers, partners, donors, and funders, who share our vision of ONE WORLD where poverty is eliminated, equality prevails and the rights of women and girls are fulfilled. In particular, we would like to recognize the Department of Foreign Affairs, Trade and Development and the Ministère des Relations internationales, Francophonie et Commerce extérieur for their partnership.

With your support, enduring change is within our grasp. Over the next five years we're poised to create 10,000 jobs and empower 4,000 girls; thank you for helping our work resonate for years to come.

# Speaking up & SPEAKING OUT

Women to be part of the process of development. If we're outside politics we fail.

omestic violence is endemic to Ghana, where one third of women experience physical violence. Widespread gender discrimination within the society and political institutions limits women's rights and access to justice. Yet, through a combination of advocacy, training, legal literacy, education, and research, women in Ghana are speaking up and speaking out so their rights, needs and concerns are heard in the courts, in the streets, and at home. With financial and volunteer support from Crossroads, legal literacy volunteers trained by Women in Law and Development in Africa (WiLDAF) empowered more than 9,000 women, men and children in 31 communities last year by instructing them on family, gender, and human rights laws. Through encouragement and support, legal literacy volunteers prepare Ghanaians with the skills and know-how to seek legal recourse to defend their rights. Because of their outreach efforts, women have re-claimed land they should have rightfully inherited, they've taken a stand against abuse, and they've challenged illegal customary practices such as widows being "given" to their brothers-in-law.

# Ghanaian women gain ground in politics

The votes are in and women are gaining ground in Ghanaian politics. Thirty-five women prepared to enter the political arena in the December 2012 national elections through the electoral candidate training program provided by Abantu for Development, in partnership with Crossroads. By acquiring in-depth knowledge of the parliamentary system and fine-tuning their campaign tactics, four of these women were successfully elected as Members of Parliament. With 30 Ghanaian women elected to parliament overall, representing almost 11 per cent of the country's MPs, women are raising their voices at the highest level of government and taking strides towards meeting the UN-recommended 30 per cent minimum female representation.

# Scaling up PRODUCTION

I must admit that I never thought I'd be able to get enough money together to start anything. Now, only two years after my training, I have my own business that is profitable and runs smoothly because of the skills I acquired through the AJA-Mali training. I'm proud of myself.

Awa Kone, attended AJA-Mali entrepreneurship training program, now a successful restaurant owner Success is brewing every day in Bolivia, Mali, Niger, and Senegal, where 12,968 people have improved their living conditions with growing incomes since 2009. Technical know-how and marketing support have built thriving agricultural and business opportunities. Throughout Western Africa, local women producers ran 12 cooperatives this year, including KOTAKI in Niger. This shea butter cooperative increases income for rural women, which enables them to access health care, nutrition and education for themselves and their families. In addition to the economic impact, women developed confidence and leadership skills from running the cooperative, which fuelled successful advocacy efforts that secured the commitment of local authorities to protect shea butter trees.









# Youth entrepreneurship programs

Following the coup in 2012, stable work has been increasingly difficult to secure in Mali, and the country's youth are plagued by unemployment. Youth entrepreneurship programs generate economic opportunities and empower young Malians to take control of their future. This year, with support from Crossroads, 121 young women and men acquired trade skills including construction, animal husbandry, food processing and garment making. Complemented by training in accounting, management and marketing, and with support from the Youth Fund, an initiative born from AJA-Mali's collaboration with Canadian partner Société d'Aide au Développement des Collectivités (SADC), 89 youth have successfully opened their own businesses.

# Boosting CONFIDENCE

Working for SWAGAA I have to respond to horrific stories of abuse in the daily news, as well as infinite health and poverty issues that affect young girls. It can be quite discouraging, but a visit to a Girls' Empowerment Club meeting lifts my spirits immediately. I've seen them singing together about how the sky is the limit for their dreams. They call each other "sister". The Girls' Empowerment Clubs have made me hopeful that my work as a volunteer is contributing to a positive future for women in this country.

G irls who attend Empowerment Clubs in Swaziland know that they have the power to change their world. The Clubs support girls in building the courage necessary to create a brighter future for themselves and their communities. This year more than 600 girls learned how to protect themselves from abuse and prevent the transmission of HIV, and enough funding was secured by Crossroads to support the launch of another 20 Girls' Empowerment Clubs in 2013-14. In the country with the highest rate of HIV infection in the world, and where one in three girls will be sexually abused, these Clubs are key in establishing the confidence girls need to protect themselves and make lasting changes in their lives.

# RESULTS THAT RESULT


The impact of this project is significant and tangible. The livelihoods of rural Bolivians are being sustained through access to an expanded Canadian coffee market.

New relationships have been established; fair trade, organic coffee from the COAINE cooperative will be available in Montreal, Ottawa and Nova Scotia later this year, as it is currently in Manitoba.

ore than 22,000 Bolivian families are producing coffee, but lack of access to profitable international markets contributes to keeping 82 per cent of rural Bolivians below the poverty line. This year, 191 individuals gained crucial skills and knowledge to increase their capacity to manage their businesses and farms and to improve their access to market opportunities. By developing a fair trade certification guide, a needs assessment for coffee-producing families, a loan system to assist production, and by linking producers to coffee micro-roasters in Canada, Crossroads volunteers have supported the establishment of fair trade partnerships with the COAINE cooperative. The fair trade premiums offered to the coffee growing families among COAINE's members have drastically improved their access to essential services, including health care and education. Three shipping containers totaling 49,400 kg of premium organic coffee have been purchased by Canadian coffee micro-roasters so far, with numbers expected to multiply.






