CHARITY CHALLENGE 2025

In February 2025, a dozen Crossroaders prepared for the trip of a lifetime: **The Senegal Charity Challenge**. From February 10th to the 20th, and after fundraising over \$7,500 each, the participants visited partners, projects and community members all around Senegal. Here is a recap of the communities they visited, from Kaolack to Kedougou, and many regions in between.

EMPOWERED WOMEN, THRIVING COMMUNITIES

Since 2018, women in Senegal have transformed their communities through Crossroads-supported initiatives, including thriving market gardens and over **330 microfinance groups**. With training in farmer field schools that supports climate change adaptation, land access and financial tools, they've dealt with food insecurity, funded healthcare and solar energy, and saw a reduction in gender-based violence instances.

In Kaolack, partner organization APROFES (Association pour la promotion de la femme Sénégalaise) has led this movement for over 40 years, offering vital support through a **Listening Centre** for survivors and championing women's health, safety, and economic independence. Despite this progress, challenges persist—from child marriage to limited access to education. But the impact is clear: where women and girls are empowered, communities thrive.







A LIFE-CHANGING TRIP

TECHNOLOGY MEETS EMPOWERMENT FOR EDUCATION

Participants also visited the **Mobile Learning Labs** in Kedougou, an initiative of the DAMCAM (My Voice, My Health) project. Equipped with solar-panels, tablets, interactive educational software, and offline Rachel servers, these fifteen labs enable adolescents—especially young women—to learn at their own pace about reproductive health, gender equality, digital skills, and more.



As a result, students show increased motivation, stronger academic performance, and enhanced digital literacy—laying the groundwork for healthier, more empowered communities.

Spending time with women farmers engaged in market gardening and talking to adolescents learning about their sexual health, schooling and rights illustrates that quantifiable progress is being made. However, the challenges these women and girls face—such as gender-based violence, female genital mutilation, early marriages, and lack of education—remain significant. We must continue to work towards an equal, sustainable world for all through international cooperation.

SCHOLARS FOR SOCIAL CHANGE



Launched in October 2023, the Scholars for Social Change (SSC) project is a three-year partnership between Crossroads International, the Mastercard Foundation, and Makerere University. The project connects Mastercard Foundation Scholars Program alumni in Uganda—especially young women, refugees, and people with disabilities—with **paid internships**, **mentorship**, **and career development opportunities**. By partnering with 26 local organizations, the initiative helps young people gain real-world experience, build skills, and find meaningful employment in the community development sector.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- **50 Mastercard Foundation Scholars** recruited in the first phase—76% were young women, including internally displaced persons, refugees, and people with disabilities.
- **26 local Ugandan organizations partnered** with Crossroads International to host Scholars in paid internships.
- Launched a **Partners Forum** to build collaboration and a Scholars Forum focused on developing soft skills for workplace readiness.
- Ongoing monitoring and feedback sessions provide continued support throughout the journey of each Scholar.

In Kumi District, Uganda, over **140 orphans and vulnerable children** are now receiving
free education—thanks to the dedication of
Grace Akello. As a Scholars for Social Change
(SSC) project scholar placed with Touch
Ministries, Grace led the recruitment process
that opened the doors of the school to those
most in need.

"The SSC project gave me an opportunity to join an NGO that is advancing community change. For me, this is a dream opportunity to make a real difference in people's lives as a social change agent," she shared.

VOLUNTEER SUCCESS STORIES

Breaking Barriers to Health and Dignity for Girls and Adolescents

In communities across Guinea, all the way to the remote Kassa Island, **784 young people** took part in health workshops and vital conversations about contraception, menstrual hygiene, and preventing early pregnancies. These sessions didn't just provide information—they helped build trust between adolescent girls and healthcare providers, making it easier for them to seek the support they need.



Mah Traoré, Crossroads' Program Support Advisor, led a powerful discussion with the girls and distributed reusable sanitary pads. A young participant shared: "I realized how important it is to talk with our parents—and that menstrual hygiene is essential to prevent infections." These moments of learning and empowerment are helping to shift norms, build knowledge, and ensure that girls have the tools they need to protect their health and futures.



Building a Brighter Future for Children with Disabilities

Thanks to the dedication of Crossroads' volunteer Brenda Okorogba, a major milestone was achieved in Eswatini: an €808,000 grant secured to support a transformative project for children with disabilities. As a Resource Mobilization Advisor, Brenda worked with local partners Imbita Swaziland Women's Finance Trust and Young Heroes to bring invaluable skills in proposal writing, risk management, sustainability planning, and monitoring and evaluation.

ESWATE

Beyond the technical support, Brenda helped build local capacity—empowering staff to confidently plan, fund, and lead future initiatives. The approved project will create meaningful change in **14 communities**, improving the lives of children with disabilities and strengthening support systems around them. This collaboration shows how strategic volunteer partnerships can unlock critical resources—and lasting impact.

IN MEMORY OF CHARLES BROWN A LIFELONG CROSSROADER

Crossroads International honours the life and legacy of Charles Brown, one of our first volunteers and a lifelong supporter, who passed away this year at the age of 100. Charles was a trailblazer—volunteering in Uganda in 1963, just as Crossroads was taking root, and remaining dedicated to our mission for more than four decades.



A close friend of founder Dr. James Robinson and co-founder Don Simpson, Charles was motivated by a deep concern for global injustice and inequality. His experience abroad was life-changing, and he often spoke of how it shaped his worldview and commitment to social change.

Charles went on to serve as Crossroads' Chair of the Board, volunteered on several committees, and played a key role in recruiting volunteers and supporting African students in Canada. His generosity—as a donor, legal advisor, and advocate—helped sustain and grow our work for many years.

We are deeply grateful for Charles Brown's unwavering belief in Crossroads and our vision of ONE WORLD. His legacy lives on in every step we take toward equality and eradicating poverty.
